CONGRATULATIONS GAA!

Another successful collaboration year between the Greeley Stampede Western Art Exhibition and Sale (SWAES) and Greeley Art Association (GAA). Below is a summary of the highlights of the 2025 SWAES:

In total, 135 artists (112 juried adults and 23 youth) submitted artwork to the 2025 SWAES. There were 327 total art pieces entered into the 2025 SWAES show, with 188 pieces displayed in the gallery area and 139 pieces of unframed 'bin' art. About one-third (28%) of the gallery and bin art were sold during the Stampede exhibition and sale. Art sales totaled \$43,000. (nearly double the 2024 sales). Artists earn 70% of the art sale price and the Stampede retains 30% of the selling price.

Twenty-one generous artists donated art for the SWAES auction. The auction raised \$4,475.00 of which 100% goes to the Stampede Foundation Scholarship Fund. Thank you artists.

Have you ever wondered what it takes to plan, organize, set up and dismantle an art exhibition? Well, here is some information that may interest you. Volunteers from the Greeley Art Association (GAA) contributed one-thousand eighty-three (1,083) volunteer hours for the art exhibition. Approximately 12-15 GAA volunteers were consistently available in the 21 days it takes to put together the art show pre-, during and post the SWAES. Volunteer time is often under-valued and viewed as "free labor". Most nonprofits calculate volunteer hours to demonstrate the "unseen value" that volunteers bring to an organization. As a 501 C7 social organization, let's calculate our volunteer time by putting a dollar value on those GAA volunteer hours using something as simple as the current Colorado minimum wage of \$14.42/hour X 1,083 = \$15616.86. That's a big chunk of sweat equity the GAA volunteers contributed to Greeley Stampede Western Art Exhibition and Sale! Just imagine the SWAES without us!

Approximately 2,500 People's Choice ballots were submitted over a 10 day period (thru end of day July 4, 2025).

- Graphite artist, Monte Moore, was voted the winner of the 2025 People's Choice award for the piece entitled "The Long Drive" (see front page).
- Oil artist, Lori Gustafson, won the Artist's Choice award of her painting entitled "Fishing Grizzly" (see front page).

DAVID NEWTON



David Newton is the only male sibling in a nuclear family of three children and two parents. A fourth generation Greeley native (out of 6 generations from Greeley now), David grew up living next door to his grandmother, an artist who painted china. At home David's father strongly encouraged him to draw and the two of them frequently drew together. Throughout the years and especially late in life, David watched his father evolve into a masterful woodworking artist, with them sometimes working together.

When asked about a first memory of when art entered his life, David credited his elderly next-door neighbor, Mrs. Harriet McCandless, for letting him see her own mammoth (to him) painting of a great forest fire burning with deer running away. It was a big deal when she introduced him to and gave him her French pastels. In the fifth grade, David remembered gaining respect from his classmates for his ability to draw a human skull on the blackboard. Later educational pursuits saw David investigate various art forms such as drawing, painting, and sculpture. In early adulthood, David was so strongly influenced by the epic trilogy, The Lord of the Rings by J.R.R. Tolkien, that jewelry-making became his main concentration after receiving an art scholarship to CSU. David also became intrigued with blacksmithing and yearned to travel to New Mexico to take a blacksmithing seminar. But through all his exploration of art forms, David ultimately realized his 'best voice in art' was as a painter (<u>DavidNewtonart.com</u>). Interestingly, David never took a painting class in college which he credits with "saving him" to paint what "flows into his eyes, filtered by mind and heart" which then ultimately transcends into his art creations.

As a native Coloradan, David's exposure to the lush, rugged and picturesque Colorado scenery influences his paintings. Many of his works feature the Rocky Mountains and various rural landscapes. One of David's 'signature' techniques is adding texture into the foregrounds of rocks and trees that creates a tangible sufficiently-three-dimensional environment begging viewers to reach out and touch the natural elements. David's still life paintings are

well-known for their exquisite realism. David was quick to point out that he has no interest in being a "biological camera" in the genre of photorealistic art which is a precise reproduction of an image. Instead, David seeks to interpret the image or object realistically in another medium that is believable and recognizable. He believes the main purpose of a still life is not the actual painting, but the intense exercise of concentrated, prolonged observation.

David has received national recognition for his large space paintings, including the moon and all the planets in the solar system such as Jupiter and Mars. David uses real photo images from NASA space technology coming from numerous space probes, as well as the Hubble and James Webb telescopes which capture space in astounding detail. In this way, David differs from many other space artists, joining those who choose their inspiration from the latest real photographs and scientific observations of space telescopes rather than fantasy (davidnewtonart.com).

Early in the interview, David stated he "loved grand things". What could be more 'grand' than the intricate dialogue and intersection of art and philosophy, both areas in which David is deeply passionate and knowledgeable. Throughout centuries of human existence, philosophy explored the fundamental questions about existence, truth and beauty, while art served as the medium to express/materialize the philosophical ideas (<u>artrewards.net</u>). Together, they reflect and shape our understanding of the human experience and the world around us (<u>eclecticgallery.co.uk</u>; artrewards.net 2025; The Socratic Method - Nietzsche).

According to David, "the artist is the speaker and the patron is the audience: art should be a catalyst for good conversation". David described art as a 'war' between life and death. Art is both sword and shield — a creation born from the knowledge that life is brief and death is certain, but beauty and meaning can endure if we make them tangible. Artists give form to what cannot be easily said in ordinary language—grief, longing, awe, trauma, ecstasy or despair. For example, Edvard Munch's scream is more than a painting; it is a scream made visible/tangible. Some of the art of Kahlo, Goya, Munch, Van Gogh, Klimt and Picasso is said to exemplify tension and coexistence between these two fundamental aspects (life and death) of existence (Afterall.com; Mutualart.com; ArtUK.org).

Choosing the right title is an art form in itself. The title of an artwork often serves as a key into the door, into the 'soul' of the art piece, setting the stage for an emotional journey through the artist's vision. David's thoughtfulness and intent in naming artwork captures the essence of the piece while inviting the audience to explore deeper meanings - a start to the conversation!

GAA readers may recall David from his 12 years of employment at *Max'ims of Greeley*. Personal communication with a frequent Max'ims patron stated she especially enjoyed talking with David "He was always very welcoming and would often spend time sharing his passion for art, while also promoting the other artists in the gallery. David developed strong relationships with many returning clients. My husband knew I loved David's art, so he went to Max'ims in search of a gift for my master's graduation. David knew I had recently lost my beloved grandmother, and he felt that a painting entitled "Towards the Top" held great symbolism for both her transition and mine. That painting is among my most cherished possessions" (personal communication, K.F. 2025).

While at Max'ims, David met and then befriended fellow artist, Clifford Bailey; later for nearly seven years they shared a studio together. David spoke of Clifford's influence on him: "Among other traits, I admired Clifford's efficiency of production. Accordingly, I have long quested to become more productive in time. Most of my technical innovations, like leather stamping and texturing, were attempts to paint faster... but they never worked to speed up production. My technical innovations turn out to only produce time-extravagant elaborations... distinctive, but not efficient."

For almost a decade, David gave himself permission to pause and "rest" from his painting. He likened this process to that of allowing a field to lie fallow to restore the fertility and potential of the field. According to Dawkins, creating art requires a lot of mental and emotional energy. Without proper rest, artists risk burnout and creative block. Taking breaks and allowing time to rest can actually improve artistic output in the long run. Rest allows the mind to relax and recharge, leading to new ideas and a fresh perspective on your own work (SDawkinsArt, 2025).

The new home of David and Gail Newton offers a uniquely ordered display of fine art and family antiquities. A professional organizer for 25 plus years, Gail creatively grouped the art and antique pieces in related categories such as David's still life images, Japanese woodcuts, the "spacious" room, and the Rocky Mountain area along with displays of woodworking (David's father's).

The skillful placement of the art pieces invites a viewer's eyes to focus, rest and contemplate each piece with no visual competition between the art. Throughout the house, the clever placement of mirrors and art offer the observer multiple views of the artwork. David has a large art studio in the lower level of the house. A family antique mirror with *special romantic meaning* hangs on the wall of the staircase landing separating the main and lower level. The mirror allows Gail and David a means to communicate with each other without having to climb up or down the stairs. Are you curious about the romantic meaning of the mirror? Well, David wrote in lipstick on the mirror years ago - W*ill you marry me?* with a ring on a rose in front of it. Obviously, it worked! This year (2025), Gail and David are celebrating their 31st anniversary of their marriage.

David works in multiple paint mediums. When asked about his favorite medium, David responded "paint, all kinds of paint". Acrylic paint is used for experimenting and technique expansion. For luscious glazing and large scale works, oil paint is the choice. When seeking a Vermeer-like luminosity to the painting, watercolor is the perfect medium. A peek into things in his studio that David could not live without include the paint colors manganese blue - the only warm blue, and quinacridone - the only way to brilliant pink; handmade texturing tools (e.g., broken hair combs, twigs, leather stamps) and Liquitex Modeling Paste.

David described two artistic "ah-ha moments" within his art journey. The first occurred in the early 1970's when David learned that "political art" can start deeper conversations. The second "ah-ha moment" came in the early 1990's when David discovered that there is "strength in numbers" as an artist commits to the production and show of his art in a collection. David enjoyed his first 20+ paintings show in a 1993 collaborative at the Tointon Gallery, and the second in a "one-man" show there in 2014. He has also enjoyed showing his work alone in week-long and weekend art festivals.

Knowing when a work is complete is a difficult often elusive decision. David suggested that he often stops working on a current painting when a new one replaces it. Stepping away from the piece and returning with fresh eyes often makes space for new ideas. "On rare occasions (with opportunity) I've even painted more on paintings that were sold 10 years before." Sometimes it's an internal knowing or listening for the moment the investment no longer needs you; one is weaned from the work, a delicate dance between refining and letting go (JulietteCrane.com).


David's passion for art spans multiple genres such as illustration, drawing, paintings, woodcuts, sculpture, creating and painting on marbled paper. When asked about a favorite artist, David responded with a long list of masters and his own descriptors of their work and/or what intrigues him about their work:

- Michelangelo (1475 1564) a brooding giant
- Rembrandt (1606-1669) like J.S. Bach; evermore humble, evermore skilled; evermore in love with God
- Johannes Vermeer (1632-1675) sublime
- Hokusai (1760-1849) a playful refining genius
- Albert Bierstadt (1830-1902) grandeur amplified
- Claude Monet (1840–1926) vibrant proliferation
- Vincent Van Gogh (1853-1890) devoted
- Carl Larsson (1853-1919) ideal of pastoral beauty
- John Singer Sargent (1856-1925) a genius, the Mozart of painting
- Mayfield Parrish (1870-1966) paints parallel worlds, more real than ours
- Ernest Blumenschein (1874-1960) other worldly beautiful
- Ivan Bilibin (1876-1942) pure childhood dreams
- Hasui Kawase (1883-1957) enthrallingly pure simplicity
- Georgia O'Keeffe (1887-1986) refined power; color, shape, line and scale
- Gerard Curtis Delano (1890-1972) perfectly crafted
- Norman Rockwell (1894-1978) wholesome to the core
- Chris Van Allsburg (1949 +) enchanting mystery
- Dan Gerhartz (1965 +) nearly Singer Sargent

The joyful and sorrowful music of Brahms or the Gregorian Chants often accompany David while he creates in the studio. Having reached 75 years, David has realized it's a pleasure to get older and avail of his objective vision. If art is self-healing, then David's extensive portfolio of still life, floral, rural landscapes, Rocky Mountains, space, Christian and Christmas art have certainly helped David heal and find a deeper understanding of the purpose of life - to pursue Truth, to pursue God.

Thank you David for sharing your art life journey with the GAA members.





Movie Review

If you are a Georgia O'Keeffe admirer then the new film, *The Brightness of Light,* is a **must-see**. It's more than just a documentary—it's a thoughtful, beautifully told story about what it means to live an artistic life on your own terms. The *Brightness of Light* explores the remarkable relationship between the celebrated American artist,

Georgia O'Keeffe, and her husband, the visionary photographer, Alfred Stieglitz. Told through 20,000 evocative letters exchanged over several decades, the documentary features the voices of Claire Danes, who reads O'Keeffe's words, and Hugh Dancy, who serves as the narrator. Central to the film is the passionate complex relationship between O'Keeffe and Stieglitz, revealing how love, art and control intertwined throughout their lives.



Directed by award-winning filmmaker, Paul Wagner, the documentary combines dramatic readings of personal letters, historical footage, expert commentary, and stunning visuals of O'Keeffe's art to explore how she became one of the most influential artists of the 20th century and known as the *Mother of American modernism*.

The film traces O'Keeffe's evolution from the early years when she nearly gave up painting in her 20's... to a summer class at the University of Virginia (1912) that marked a turning point in her creative life. In the 1920's New York art scene, the support of Stieglitz saw her quickly become a sensation with her bold abstract works. When (mostly) male critics misinterpreted her flower paintings as purely sensual, O'Keeffe pushed back and insisted on defining her art on her own terms. In her later life (1940+), O'Keeffe left the East Coast art world behind and moved to the deserts of New Mexico, where she found solitude and a deep connection to the natural landscape.

Ghost Ranch El Rancho de los Brujos^{[1}



O'Keeffe lived independently and worked prolifically well into her late 80's despite significant vision loss from macular degeneration. Her creative freedom flourished while living at Ghost Ranch and Abiquiu. Ultimately, she became a symbol of strength, resilience, and feminist self-determination.

The documentary has been screened at film festivals, art museums, and universities around the country. Viewers and

critics alike have praised it for offering a nuanced and authentic look at both O'Keeffe the artist and O'Keeffe the woman. **GREELEY** is fortunate to have an encore screening at the **KRESS Theater on September 24, 2025 at 7:00 pm.**





Andrea Carlson: A Constant Sky is the first museum survey of mixed-media visual artist Andrea Carlson (Ojibwe and European settler descent, b. 1979). Carlson creates works that challenge the colonial narratives presented by modern artists, museum collections, and cannibal genre horror films. Utilizing a combination of text and complex visual references to animals, art objects, and cultural belongings, Carlson creates prismatic landscapes that foil American landscape genre painting.

The Honest Eye: Camille Pissarro's Impressionism is the first major U.S. retrospective of Camille Pissarro, known as "the first impressionist," in over 40 years. The exhibition will present an overview of the artist's illustrious career and examine his singular role within the Impressionist movement, bringing together more than 80 paintings from nearly 50 international museums and private collections, alongside six works from the Denver Art Museum's holdings.

GAA Executive Board Meeting Minutes: August 25, 2025

The August 25, 2025 Executive Board Meeting of the Greeley Art Association (GAA) was called to order by GAA President Gail Mothershed at 12:17p.m. at the Showcase Art Center in Greeley.

Members in Attendance: Gail and Tom Mothershed, Colette Pitcher, Roger Huffenberger, Joe Mora, Carol Larson, Debbie Pilch, Michelle Hamilton, Mary Lynne Pruett, Claire McNear, Cameron Clements, and Janet McGregor.

President's Report: President Gail Mothershed welcomed everyone back from the summer break. She shared a flyer for the Estes Park Studio Tour with the idea that a group may travel to explore the studio tour next year and/or consider having a GAA studio tour. President Mothershed has contacted Sandie Whitman, oil painter, for being a program presenter, as well as Tim Preston, potter, and Haley Farrow, oil painter. Debbie Pilch suggested a tour the Distortions Unlimited company in Greeley.

Secretary's Report: Claire McNear summarized the May 5, 2025 meeting minutes. With no additions or changes the May 5, 2025 meeting minutes were approved as written (Hamilton, Huffenberger).

Treasurer's Report: Cameron Clements reported that GAA has a balance of \$2,175.63 plus \$149.35 in petty cash. Expenses since May included purchase of a tent and entry fee to the Greeley Arts Picnic, an organizer for the storage unit at the Showcase, materials for SWAES hooks and gift kits for the Stampede Youth artists. Invoices totaling \$1,860.62 were sent to the Stampede Committee for reimbursement. Cameron reported that GAA added three members over the summer, Maurina Clements, June Mattox, and Elizabeth Atkinson. A motion to accept the August 25, 2025 financials was approved as presented (Pilch, T. Mothershed).

Membership Report: Joe Mora shared the names of the three new GAA members.

Newsletter Editor's Report: Michelle Hamilton announced that the next GAA newsletter, "The Unlimited Palette", will be sent to members mid-September. This edition will include information on the Stampede Western Art Exhibition and Sale (SWAES), the Greeley Arts Picnic, GAA Plein Air events, and an artist showcase on David Newton.

Programs: Colette Pitcher reported that the September 8, 2025 program will be Suzette McIntyre presenting "Layered Light". The presenter for the October meeting is to be determined, possibly Tim Preston from the Clay Center. In November, Kathy Swafford will present a portrayal of Georgia O'Keefe. Our December meeting will be a holiday party with pizza and gift exchange. No other programs are scheduled at this time for 2026.

Discussion took place regarding a possible change in date and location for General membership meetings. President Mothershed proposed that GAA have meetings on the first Thursday of the month with the Centennial Library as the meeting place. Additionally, there would be a meet and greet time with light snacks, along with a short general meeting before the presentation.

OLD BUSINESS:

Arts Picnic: President Mothershed reported that nine GAA members participated in the Greeley Arts Picnic on July 26 & 27, 2025. According to Tom Mothershed and Carol Larson, the group was pleased with the new tent and working in shifts. Many GAA business cards were distributed to interested individuals.

Pinewood Lodge Art Retreat: President Mothershed gave a shout out to Cameron Clements and the crew at Pinewood Lodge for an enjoyable weekend retreat of painting and comradeship. President Mothershed reported that the retreat fulfilled numerous items requested by the membership including plein air, art demonstrations, and nature hike opportunities. In the future, a critiquing group might be added. There may be an opportunity to return to Pinewood Lodge in the winter. A motion was made and approved to pay Colette Pitcher \$100 for an art demonstration provided at Pinewood Lodge (Clements, Hamilton).

SWAES UPDATE: Michelle Hamilton reported information from the 2025 Stampede Western Art Exhibition and Sale (SWAES). There were 327 pieces of art at the SWAES including Adult, Youth, and bin art, of which 93 pieces were sold (28%). These numbers do not include the auction items donated by 21 different artists. Colette Pitcher reported that the art sales almost doubled from 2024. The art auction made \$4775.00. All proceeds go to the Stampede Foundation for Weld County youth scholarships. Michelle Hamilton calculated that GAA members volunteered 1,083 hours to the SWAES. This time included the two weeks prior, during, and after the Stampede. Michelle calculated the volunteer time to be worth \$16,000 if valued at the Colorado minimum wage rate of \$14.31 an hour. Colette Pitcher shared a summary of GAA member thoughts and recommendations regarding the 2025 SWAES, which were collected by Amy Mattox and Gayle Niles at a July 18, 2025 gathering where members reviewed the SWAES events. Pros and cons were shared, as well as recommendations for the 2026 Stampede Committee. Discussion took place on the mission of our group in relation to the SWAES, possibilities for GAA member artists to participate in the 2026 SWAES, suggestions for adult prize money and changes to hours for sitting the show. A SWAES Proposal Committee was created to consolidate and present requests to the Stampede Committee for the 2026 SWAES. Members on this committee include Carol Larson, Michelle Hamilton, Mary Lynne Pruett, Claire McNear, and Gail Mothershed.

New Business:

Tointon Gallery Art Show: Michelle Hamilton reported that the GAA has accepted an invitation for an art show Feb 6-28, 2026 at the Tointon Gallery in downtown Greeley. "A Brush with Nature" will be an artist collective of works from GAA members. All artwork must be original and created within the last five years (2020-2026). A call for entry with dates and details will be available in the near future. The opening reception will be held on Friday, February 6th from 5:00-7:00pm.

Publicity Chair: President Mothershed shared a concern that we do not have a publicity chair at this time to keep the GAA website and social media up to date. Colette Pitcher reported that she recently updated the GAA website. Discussion took place on the need for a publicity chairperson. Cameron Clements stated that he would like to step up for that position but needs an individual to take the Treasurer's role. Cameron will provide support with updates on Facebook. A motion was made for GAA to pay \$2.00 per month for iCloud storage of photos from GAA events (Hamilton, McNear). Motion passed.

Historian: Carol Larson was designated as Historian for GAA. Carol reported that she retrieved items from the storage unit this summer. She plans to consolidate the information to a digital format.
