

SPRING BRINGS PLEIN AIR TO GAA

En Plein air (French for "in the open air") refers to the act of painting outdoors, directly from the natural environment, rather than working from memory, imagination, or photographs in a studio. Plein air is both a technique and a philosophy that emphasizes direct observation, natural light, and the immediacy of the moment.

More than just a style, the spirit of plein air is about the artist's immersion into the natural world and the emotional and visual response to the environment. It's rooted in the concept that truth and beauty are best directly observed, rather than artificially reconstructed. Plein air painting invites the artist to slow down, observe deeply, and translate the living world into art.

Key characteristics of plein air painting include:

- Natural Light: Artists paint scenes as they appear in the moment, capturing subtle shifts in light, weather, and atmosphere.
- **Spontaneity**: The process is often fast-paced due to changing conditions (sunlight, clouds, wind), leading to loose, expressive brushwork.
- **Authenticity of Place**: There's a strong sense of *being there*—plein air captures the mood and spirit of a specific time and location.
- Portable Equipment: Artists use compact easels, paint boxes, and limited palettes designed for mobility.
- **Expect Imperfection:** It's about learning not perfection (go home and review what worked and what did not work and why)

Landscape painting en plein air is one of the classic forms of artistic expression. It challenges the artist to observe and capture the natural world in real time, emphasizing light, atmosphere, and the spirit of a place. Need ideas for landscape paintings? Consider rolling hills and meadows, rivers, lakes and coastlines, mountains and rock formations, forest edges or single trees, rural barns or winding paths, animals grazing in pastures, light hitting fields, buildings or rocks.

Wondering when is the best time to paint en plein air? Well, it depends on what you want to paint, the lighting, the season, your personal schedule and of course the weather. Some artists are 'diehard' plein air painters outside in all weather conditions. Others consider themselves 'fair weather plein air artists' stepping out into the natural world only on warm sunny days.

Below are a few hints to consider for the time of the day to schedule your plein air painting session:

The **Early Morning** (Golden Hours 6:00 - 9:00 AM) offers soft warm light, casting beautiful highlights and long cool shadows. Typically, there are fewer people around at this time - it's great for painting in public spaces. The challenges at this time are that light changes fast and the temperatures are cooler.

Late Morning to Mid-day (9:00 - 1:00PM) the light is stronger and more direct which helps to define clear forms and high contrast. The shadows are shorter and colors can be more saturated. The challenges of this time of day is that paint dries faster (especially with acrylic) and light can become 'flat' or overly harsh.

The **Late Afternoon** (Golden Hours 4:00-6:00 PM). Similar to the morning golden hour, in that the light at this time is warm and directional. Late afternoon offers rich color contrasts and dramatic skies. This time of day is ideal for sunsets, glowing fields or reflective water scenes. Caution - the light fades quickly so artists may need to paint fast and/or return the next day at the same time to capture the essence.

Evening Dusk (~sunset to ~30 minutes after). The quality of the light is fading, moody, and cool. Offers quiet expressive emotional lighting for tonal studies or high contrast silhouettes. These hours are NOT ideal for beginners due to rapidly changing light and limited visibility.

Nocturnal (30 minutes after sunset to 2–3 hours into the night). Limited colors mostly dark blues, purples, and muted tones—less color, more focus on light and shadow. Soft edges with less sharp details—things look more blurry or dreamy. Strong differences between light and dark areas creates drama and moodiness.




ROGER HUFFENBERGER

Roger Huffenberger was born in July 1939 in Springfield, Ohio. Roger was raised in Springfield and for a few years he lived with his grandparents who owned a local grocery store. As a child, Roger mostly remembers coloring as his 'artwork'. Although he cannot recall why or how but, at approximately 8 or 9 years of age, Roger remembers he had a keen interest in drawing Egyptians. Although he enjoyed art as a child, he did not take it seriously until closer to retirement age.

As a young 10-year old boy, Roger recalled asking his grandfather for money. His grandfather escorted Roger to the grocery store to learn how the family 'made' money. From that day forward, Roger worked with the public in the grocery business. First, he learned to separate pop/soda bottles and other chores, then Roger ran the candy counter under the watchful eye of his grandmother. A "Pennsylvanian dutchman" named Jim worked as a butcher in the grocery store. When Roger was an young adolescent, Jim took Roger under his wing and taught Roger the skill of meat cutting.

As a senior in high school, Roger studied and apprenticed as a 'pattern maker'. This editor asked Roger to describe the skilled craft. "Pattern making is a very precise (e.g., measuring within one one-thousandth of an inch) specialized form of woodworking". Pattern-makers make wooden patterns for sand-casting iron and other metals. Although Roger never again worked as a pattern maker, the precision and specialized craftsmanship of the pattern trade stayed with him.

Graduating high school in 1958, Roger and a school friend saved up \$50.00 and satisfied their 'rambling fever' by hitchhiking from Ohio to California and back. At one point in Estes Park, Colorado, Roger found a job as a dishwasher, maintenance worker and meat cutter at the Wind River Ranch about 7 miles south of Estes Park. After a few months, Roger returned to Ohio and then to Chicago. Soon, Roger bought a bus ticket from Chicago to Florida. He arrived with little remaining money and his suitcase was supposedly on the next bus, Roger walked downtown and met a man who was opening up a drugstore. Roger asked the owner if he had any work available. The owner recognized that Roger was in a 'pinch'. He set Roger up with a watch, a meal, directions to a local boarding house (\$7.00/week). The drugstore owner offered Roger a job starting the next day. While working the night shift, Roger was struck by a beautiful redhead in yellow shorts named "Florine" and her young daughter who entered the store. This meeting began the story of Roger and Florine.

The couple moved to Pueblo, Colorado in the winter of 1959. Roger and Florine married in May 1960. Roger worked in a steel mill. When he was laid off from the mill, Roger secured a job cutting meat for *King Soopers* in Pueblo. Roger worked for *King Soopers* as a meat cutter and helped them open several stores in areas such as Colorado Springs, Denver and Fort Collins.

While living in Colorado Springs around 1996, Roger's interest in art reappeared when he met a woman who was making wreaths. Roger started making patterns for her wreaths (Santa, Reindeer, Stars, etc.) and he took watercolor classes at *Michael's*. His art spark was fully reignited when he worked in an Art Gallery in Cañon City. In 2003, Roger met a local artist who gave him painting lessons and introduced him to "bleeding tissue paper", a type of tissue paper colored with vegetable dyes. The application of water on the colorful tissue paper creates the 'bleeding' effect. (Note: regular tissue paper will NOT create this effect).

Besides creating art by layering and painting on bleeding tissue paper, Roger also sculpts with paper-mache and uses the bleeding tissue paper as the final layer on the sculpture.



By measuring, touching/feeling his own head, Roger sculpted a paper-mache bust (photo left) of his own head. Bleeding tissue paper is draped over the bust as the final layer. The bleeding tissue paper adds texture, color and makes the

sculpture look like it's carved from wood. Similarly, the hat looks like leather even though it too is papermache with an overlay of bleeding tissue paper. To the right, Roger's sculpture of the heron and turtle

resembles a bronze casting, yes? Nope, the heron sculpture is also paper-mache covered with gold-bronze colored bleeding tissue paper offering the polished color and the 'feathered' texture.



Roger is inspired by mountains, prairies, old farms and old barns. As he views the old buildings and farms on the landscapes, Roger finds himself wondering "how many dreams went down the drain". When asked about his favorite artist, Roger named the English romantic painter, J.W. Turner. Turner was known for his expressive use of color and light in landscapes and marine scenes. Roger admired how towards the end of Turner's life how his colors ran together. Roger retold a story attributed to J.W. Turner... when a woman approached Turner stating that she had never seen colors in nature that looked like those in Turner's paintings... Turner responded "yes, but wouldn't you like to!".

When asked to describe something in his studio he could not live without (e.g. tool, color or medium)? Roger quickly replied "my eyesight". Next, Roger was invited to describe how he knows when a work is complete/finished? "...you don't know... It's an ongoing process. You think it's done... walk away and come back to see something else is needed. To me, the most important part is to experiment and have fun".

Although Roger enjoys working with many art mediums such as pencils/graphite, acrylic, paper-mache, and wood, at the moment, bleeding tissue paper seems to have captured Roger's heART. Thank you Roger for sharing your life and art.

Glassblowing with a MAPP torch is a relatively accessible method for beginners or small-scale artists who want to create glass objects. MAPP (Methylacetylene-Propadiene) gas is commonly used because it burns hotter than propane, which makes it ideal for melting glass. We had a full house of GAA members in attendance who were *blown away by this glass act*!

- All 2D art must be Gallery ready: framed for hanging with no wire. No saw tooth hangers.



GAA MEETING MINUTES



GAA Executive Board Meeting Minutes: March 3, 2025
The March 3, 2025 Executive Board Meeting of the Greeley Art
Association (GAA) was called to order by GAA President Gail
Mothershed at 1:58 p.m. at the Showcase Art Center.

Members in Attendance: Gail and Tom Mothershed, LeAnne Bodine, Mary Lynne Pruett, Debbie Pilch, Colette Pitcher, Michelle Hamilton, Claire McNear, Jean Stoll, Joe Mora, Cameron Clements, Roger Huffenberger, and Jean Mark.

President's Report: President Gail Mothershed reported that she and Vice President Tom Mothershed met with Dana Buckingham, the Marketing and Communications Director of the Greeley Creative District. They learned about the remodeling plan of the former Macy-

Allnut building on 7th Ave and 13th St in Greeley, which will become an Arts complex with a store front, community meeting areas, and space to showcase works from local artists. Gail and Tom began to explore ways for GAA to possibly become aligned with the Creative District. This city complex is expected to be completed in 2027.

Secretary's Report: With no additions or corrections, the February 3, 2025, meeting minutes were approved as written (Hamilton, Pilch).

Treasurer's Report: LeAnne Bodine reported that GAA has a balance of \$5,162.84 plus \$149.35 in petty cash for a total of \$5,312.19 in the account. LeAnne shared that she had purchased a stamp for endorsement of checks to the association. A motion to accept the March 3, 2025 financials was approved as presented (Pilch, McNear). LeAnne alerted the GAA Executive Board that a new treasurer will be needed in the near future.

Membership Report: Joe Mora announced that GAA has 79 members, 15 of which have not yet paid the 2025 dues. Members who have not paid 2025 dues by April 30, 2025, will be dropped from the membership. Gail and Tom Mothershed, along with Joe Mora, met with new members in February at the Mothershed home. The gatherings were well received and was a way to get acquainted with new members in a small setting. Andy Grout has expressed an interest in creating a critiquing group.

Newsletter Report: The next GAA newsletter, "The Unlimited Palette", will be sent to members in mid-May, according to Michelle Hamilton.

OLD BUSINESS:

Stampede Western Art Exhibition and Sale (SWAES): Colette Pitcher shared that Kim Mackey, from Pueblo, CO, has been selected as the juror for the 2025 SWAES. GAA and the SWAES has also invited Mr. Mackey to bring his own work to display. Colette stated that she hopes the Stampede committee will offer an honorarium for the juror and money for artist prizes.

The deadline for entering the 2025 SWAES is May 5, 2025.

Video Library: GAA has a number of DVDs available for check out to members. Michelle Hamilton volunteered to put together a video library booklet to streamline the check-out/check-in process. At this time, the DVDs are located in the kitchen at the Showcase Art Center inside the GAA mail box. Please return any DVDs you may have to the Showcase when you are finished, so other members may enjoy them. Cameron Clements will survey membership for requests of additional purchases to the DVD library.

GAA Survey: Cameron Clements shared the results of the GAA survey in an email to all members.

Tointon Gallery Show: Michelle Hamilton reported on the successful GAA "Creative Collective" fine art show at the Tointon Gallery February 7-28, 2025. Thirty-eight members with a total of 72 pieces of art participated. There were seven pieces sold, one of which by Carol Kreps, was purchased by the City of Greeley. In addition to 1000 visitors enjoying the exhibit at the gallery, a review in the Denver Art Review Inquiry + Analysis (DARIA) Magazine was published about the GAA Tointon Gallery Show.

Michelle shared that Will Dillon, curator of the Tointon Gallery, would like GAA to commit to an annual art show, with the month of January 2026 being the next exhibit month. The delivery date for art would be December 29, 2025, and the artist reception date would be January 2, 2026. It was suggested that a poll of members take place prior to a commitment for the exhibit.

New Business:

- -Colette Pitcher proposed an idea for a gallery space at the Showcase Art Center, which could be an art coop. Discussion on this topic will take place at a later date.
- -Arts Picnic: Colette Pitcher announced the call for booth entry for the 2025 Greeley Arts Picnic is in progress at this time. The membership will be polled to see if there is interest in participating. Booth fees for the event are \$150 for a 10'x10' space. GAA may consider purchasing a new tent. Gail Mothershed said she would investigate pricing on a new tent.
- -The deadline has passed for entering the Earth Day Fair at the Unitarian Church in Greeley. The Earth Day event will take place on April 26th.

Programs: April 7th, we will tour the studio "Work of Art" at 1530 6th Avenue, Greeley, owned by GAA members Gayle Timms and Rusty Richardson.

May 5th, GAA member and photographer Lewis Jackson will present on Photo-liminalism.

Announcements: Acrylic Live will take place March 26-28th, with Essential Techniques Day on March 25th. Colette Pitcher is one of the artists demonstrating at this live virtual event.

President Mothershed adjourned the Executive Board Meeting at 3:00p.m.

In the 19 days of the "Creative Collective" show, seven pieces of art were sold. Michelle shared that Will Dillon, curator of the Tointon Gallery, would like GAA to commit to an annual art show, with the month of January 2026 for the next exhibition. A show of hands was requested and a majority of the members present were in favor of the January 2026 date.

New Business:

President Mothershed requested a show of hands for interest in a critique group. Andy Grout, a new GAA member, would like to head up such a group. There were 6-8 members who were interested.

There is a video library of art related DVDs available for check out, located in the kitchen at the Showcase Art Center. Cameron Clements will send out a survey for members to request DVDs to purchase. If you have checked out a DVD, please be sure to return it to the Showcase. President's Report: President Gail Mothershed reported that she and Vice President Tom Mothershed met with Colette Pitcher regarding updated information on the Stampede Western Art Show and Exhibition (SWAES). President Mothershed invited Cory Sample to brief us on the SWAES.

SWAES UPDATE: Cory Sample reported that the Greeley Stampede Committee will meet tonight, April 7, 2025, at which time he will request additional funds for additional advertising of the art show to western artists. So far, eleven artists with 31 pieces of art, have signed up on callforentry.org (CaFe) to show at the exhibition. Cory reported that the group will hang as much youth art as possible, however there are no youth entries to date. The entries are trending slower than last year. With additional money for advertising, the SWAES can market to the western section of the US. Cory requested that GAA make a list of specific items to fix or replace as we conduct our work during the Stampede. This way he can request funds in the Fall for the following year. Cory shared that the upfront cost of CaFe is \$750 with an annual renewal of \$200, which will give additional funds going forward. Any individual can find more information at GreeleyStampede.org.

President Mothershed informed us that Val Vickarelli has agreed to chair the reception committee, providing she can send out "Save the Date" postcards to previous attendees. Colette Pitcher sent out a link to past artists, inviting them to participate in the 2025 SWAES. Cameron Clements agreed to assist anyone in our group with the entry sign up on CaFe. President Mothershed asked Cory for money to purchase ribbons and youth prizes. Tom and Gail Mothershed, Amy Mattox, and Gretchen Chen Tarnasky delivered SWAES folders and posters with call for entry details for youth art to 30 Weld County high schools. Michelle Hamilton will have SWAES committee sign up sheets available online as well as at the Showcase Art Center.

GAA UPDATE: President Mothershed reported that GAA member, Andy Grout wants to put together a critique group. He will choose a location and date for this group to meet.

Secretary's Report: Claire McNear reported there were no additions or changes to the meeting minutes. The March 3, 2025 meeting minutes were approved as written (Hamilton, Bodine).

Treasurer's Report: LeAnne Bodine reported that GAA has a balance of \$5,124.79 plus \$149.35 in petty cash for a total of \$5,274.14 in the account. A motion to accept the April 7, 2025 financials was approved as presented (McNear, Clements).

Membership Report: Joe Mora reported that GAA has one new member, Gretchen Chen Tarnasky. As of April 1, 2025, the group has 69 members. Cameron Clements requested to be included when Gail and Tom Mothershed meet with new members.

Newsletter Report: Michelle Hamilton announced that the next GAA newsletter, "The Unlimited Palette", will be sent to members in late May. Michelle requested an update on the number of SWAES entries, after the call for entry closes on May 5th. This publication will include SWAES information and an interview with GAA member Roger Huffenberger.

OLD BUSINESS:

Arts Picnic: President Mothershed reported that eight GAA members are interested in selling artwork at the Greeley Arts Picnic on July 26 & 27, 2025. The sign up deadline with the City of Greeley is April 12th. According to President Mothershed, Colette Pitcher has a gently used tent for sale.
