THANK YOU to GAA two-term Immediate Past President Carol Larson. We appreciate your creativity, guidance and leadership over the past four years. Rumor has it, traveling is on your agenda. We look forward to your paintings and Warren's photographs of your travels and adventures.

Treasurer Janet McGregor has resigned from the GAA Board. Janet has agreed to continue in her Treasurer role until a new Treasurer is elected. Thank you Janet for your excellent work as Treasurer. We appreciate your development of Treasury spreadsheets and your research and transition banks for the GAA accounts.



Teresa Mueller was raised in Monroe, Nebraska and Arvada, Colorado. The eldest of four children, two brothers and a sister born in Nebraska, Teresa was born in Corona, California during the time her father was in the US Marines.

The family moved to Denver, Colorado in 1963 so her brother could attend a school with programming for hard of hearing students. Fletcher Miller School in Lakewood, CO offered high quality educational programming for all students with unique needs that promoted independence and autonomy for a lifetime of learning.

Teresa attended Arvada High School (AHS) and worked part-time at the Arvada Public Library. After high school graduation in 1971, Teresa moved to Greeley, Colorado to attend the University of Northern Colorado (UNC) double-majoring in Elementary Education and Spanish. Upon graduation from UNC, Teresa was offered a teaching position in Johnstown, Colorado pending program funding from the federal government. Funding uncertainty saw Teresa accept a guaranteed position in Worland, Wyoming teaching Spanish in kindergarten through 3rd grade for one academic year.

A year later, in 1976, funding was secured for the program in Johnstown. Teresa was hired as the bi-lingual teacher for first (one year) and third grades (19 years). In the early 1980s, as more and more bi-lingual programs transitioned to English as a Second Language (ESL) programs, Teresa returned to UNC and earned a Master's Degree as a Media Specialist with a photography minor. When she graduated with her Master's Degree (1982), Teresa secured the position as the Johnstown School Librarian for an additional 12 years. Teresa retired in 2009 after 32 years at Letford Elementary School in Johnstown.

Teresa's retirement was a huge loss of 'institutional' knowledge' to the school system. When an elementary and charter school assessment

position came available, the district jumped at the chance to contract with Teresa to conduct assessments of gifted and talented students. In addition, Teresa was contracted to provide *Access Testing* to determine English proficiency for students who spoke more than one language.

Throughout her life, Teresa enjoyed drawing, crafting and creating. In high school, Teresa's artwork was selected for a city-wide art show on display in Denver's May D&F Department Store. Teresa's art included a multi-media piece consisting of her pen and ink drawing of wine bottles as candle holders. Teresa incorporated colored tissue paper onto the drawing to create a colorful mosaic.

In the early 1980s, Teresa started making cards. A school colleague sold rubber stamps (DOTS) through home parties. Teresa's card making expertise and skills continue to this day. She has a collection of tools, materials, manual and digital machines with which she makes cards. During her teaching and librarian careers, Teresa "loved creating the school bulletin boards".

Teresa described taking a continuing education art history class at UNC from Chip Coronel. Professor Coronel enjoyed exposing students to the real art history by way of field trips to museums and other art-related experiences. Teresa recalled an art history class week-long camping trip to Mesa Verde, Colorado. Students toured the Mesa Verde Ruins in the morning; the afternoon was designated painting en plein air. She was somewhat surprised that her art history class included creating art. While Teresa's motivation for taking the class was largely to earn continuing education credits for her teaching license, many other students in the class were art degree seeking students. The Mesa Verde art history field trip and introduction to en plein air type pursuits reactivated Teresa's drawing and art interests.

In 2010, a friend encouraged Teresa to take a weekly watercolor class with Colette Pitcher of the Showcase Art Center in Greeley. Since then, Teresa has continued to attend watercolor classes at the Showcase. Teresa has also shared her card making expertise by offering 1-day seminars at the Showcase. Attendees may use their own art work for cards and/or learn to use Teresa's *Cricut* cutting machine or her *Brother* digital scan and cut. The most recent card seminar was at the end of January 2023 at the Showcase

Art Center featuring a day-long seminar on making cards for Valentine's Day .

Watercolor is Teresa's preferred medium. She enjoys realistic artists such as Renoir and her preferred scenes include landscapes, still life and animal paintings. A fan of texture, Teresa is fondly known in one art class as the "salt queen". At just the 'right time', Teresa often adds a few grains of table salt to her watercolor. The salt acts like a sort of resist to the watercolor resulting in a snowflake-like effect. The area where the salt touches the paper will be lighter in color. The salt will push the watercolor pigment away and thus the lighter spot will be surrounded by a darker shade. Teresa also enjoys using heat embossed techniques as well as incorporating the vibrant and vivid effects of watercolor ink crystals sold under the name *Brusho*.

Friends and family members enjoy Teresa's creative endeavors. Many save her handmade cards using them as yearly seasonal decorations. Her sister proudly displays Teresa's eagle painting in her home.


When asked how she knows when a painting is complete, Teresa quipped "I ask Colette" <grin>. Teresa added that she often sets her paintings on her piano to look at it for days, weeks or months to help her determine what the painting needs. Like many other artists, Teresa indicated she can play with or "neener-neener" a painting to death especially because she loves to paint precise details.

Teresa lives in Johnstown where her hands and mind are seldom idle. She knits, crochets, cross stitches, takes photographs, makes cards, draws, and paints watercolor. Teresa is an engaged member of the Windsor Community Playhouse and an avid outdoor camping enthusiast with her loyal dog-companion, a Cairin-terrier mix named McTavish "Tavi".

Art Imitates Art on Broadway

Artists Andy Warhol and Jean-Michel Basquiat are the subjects of the play *The Collaboration* running on Broadway (ends on Feb 11/23).

The play offers a glimpse into the feisty collaboration between the two pop painters whose philosophies of art differ vastly. Actors Paul Bettany (Warhol) and Jeremy Pope (Basquiat) had never met one another when they were hired to play Warhol and Basquiat. Bettany suggests the dramatization is about "two men with seemingly no common ground finding common ground. The actors bring the artists to life on stage despite the significant clashes of ideas of what art is and what art is for. The play explores what art making means, its value and what different generations can learn from each other" (Playbill).

Two renowned artists develop a professional partnership and personal friendship. The artists were reluctantly brought together in the 1980s by their shared art dealer, who saw a joint exhibit between the two as a way to rekindle Warhol's stagnating career (he hadn't made a painting in 20+ years) and kickstart the young Basquiat's. The artists could not have been much more different; Warhol was 30 years Basquiat's senior. Warhol was a pop artist; Basquiat, a Neo-Expressionist. Both cynical for different reasons — Warhol disliked the art world's quickness to move on to the next new artists and forget older ones, and Basquiat knew that the odds were stacked against him as a Black man in a white-dominated industry. They frequently look down on each other's age, race, and artist style yet find common ground in their desire for art to be about expression and less about money. They ultimately create many works together such as Ten Punching Bags and Zenith (NewYorkTheaterguide.com). Watch for the film by same name in Fall 2023. (adapted from Playbill).

Loving Vincent is a favorite movie of more than a few GAA members. It's the world's first fully painted feature film. What? Yes, you read correctly - it's a painted film.

Director Dorota Kobiela trained as a painter. Painting was her passion until she made her first movie. Film enticed her away from painting. After a few years, Dorota realized she missed the contemplative soulful world of painting. She experienced a crisis; looking for solace she turned to the letters of Vincent van Gogh. Out of the letters emerged Dorota's idea to combine painting and film. She took Vincent at his word in his last letter "we cannot speak other than in our paintings" (van Gogh). She embarked on bringing his paintings to life to speak for him.

The film was shot with actors first. Then a team of 100 painters painted 65,000 frames on over 1,000 canvases. Working at studios in the Polish cities of Gdansk and Wrocław and a studio in Athens, the film took 4 years to complete.

Van Gogh's works such as Sunflowers, Starry Night, and many self portraits make him one of the world's most famous painters. Along with his paintings, van Gogh is also remembered for his tortured life including cutting off his ear and shooting himself while painting at his easel. He painted until the end of his unhappy and misunderstood life. In 1890 at the age of 37 years, van Gogh died having only ever sold ONE painting.

GAA Field-trip - Loveland Museum

Greeley Art Association (GAA) members enjoyed an evening field-trip on January 5, 2023 to the Loveland Museum to see the John Mellencamp Exhibit entitled MELLENCAMP Painting and Assemblages.



Perhaps better known for his music under the name John Cougar Mellencamp, John Mellencamp has been making music and touring since the 1970s. Some of us may remember hit songs such as: *Hurts So Good, Little Pink Houses, Crumbling Down* and number 1 in 1982, (a little ditty 'bout) *Jack & Diane*. Starting to paint earnestly in the 1980s, Mellencamp was attracted to portraiture works of Otto Dix and Max Beckmann. Both Dix and Beckmann were early German Expressionist artists with an existential focus on the human condition. These artists were concerned with evoking powerful reactions to their art by using bright colors and jagged brushstrokes, leaving behind previous expectations of aesthetically pleasing and easy-to-interpret art.

Doing exactly what expressionism is designed to do, Mellencamp's work captured and evoked strong feelings and reactions. Bold brush strokes often exaggerated or distorted features, and resulted in a less aesthetically pleasing type of art preferred by this GAA member. As a result, I am left with few words to capture my experience at the exhibition.

Respectfully, I borrowed the words from the Loveland Museum "aha!" brochure to describe the art of John Mellencamp. "...an accomplished painter, collector and activist, Mellencamp exposes unsettling but beautiful truths with an attitude of defiance and narrative sensibility that echoes the earnest voice of the American heartland. In addition to recent paintings, this exhibition includes a selection of assemblages, adding yet another dimension to a unique body of work. Like his music, Mellencamp's paintings are carefully composed through the structural requirements of

harmony, rhythm and order, and are thematically in line with the small-town earnest voice of the heartland" (aha!, January-April 2023 p. 7).

Using a variety of unusual substrates and medium, Mellencamp paints on plywood, masonite, mirrors, canvas, corrugated board using house paint, oil, charcoal and colored pencil.

Creating Light Out of Dark Days

GAA members who attended the Loveland Museum field trip were also treated to a unique installation entitled *Light of Appreciation* created by Boulder artist and nurse, Laura England Weiss.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, Weiss came out of retirement as a nurse to help the Boulder County Department of Health vaccination program. After inoculating thousands of people, Weiss noticed piles of vaccine bottles that were going to be tossed in the trash.


As a registered nurse, Weiss understood why the bottles were designated as "medical waste", however, her artistic side saw beauty in the glass bottles. After seeking approval from the Boulder Public County Health, Weiss was allowed to take the bottles home for use in an art project. From there, her creative process began.

Weiss knew she wanted to make some sort of light but she did not have a clear vision of what the art light would be. After searching online for a chandelier base, Weiss began playing with the bottles and her design. First she cleaned and sanitized each bottle, drilled holes in the bottom of the vials and strung them together using gauge wire and adding red and clear crystals. From there the chandelier just came together.

Comprised of approximately 300 glass bottles, 271were from the Moderna vaccine and about 10 smaller vaccine bottles came from Johnson & Johnson vials. Weiss went through significant channels to obtain approval to use the vials; she had to agree not to sell them or give them away (since Weiss' request there has been a rule change - no future glass vial use for art projects).

News of the chandelier went viral after the Boulder Public County Health Department posted a photo of the completed piece on Facebook. The Facebook post has had over 10 million views, 24,000 shares and almost 7,000 comments. Weiss is currently seeking a permanent public home for the one of a kind art piece *Light of Appreciation* (adapted from Loveland Reporter Herald).

GAA EXECUTIVE BOARD AND GENERAL MEETING MINUTES January 9, 2023

At 2:04 p.m. on January 9, 2023, President Carol Larson called the Executive Board/ General meeting to order. The two meetings were combined this month due to the January 5th membership event at the Loveland Art Museum, in lieu of a January presentation.

Members in Attendance: Colette Pitcher, Delilah Fiechter, Ralph Tarnasky, Michelle Hamilton, Warren Larson, Claire McNear, Carol Larson, Debbie Pilch, Jean Mark, and Janet McGregor.

Election of Officers: President Carol Larson called for a cease of nominations for the position of Vice-President. The motion was made and unanimously approved by those members in attendance for Ralph Tarnasky as Vice-President.

Resignation of Treasurer: Janet McGregor has resigned as GAA Treasurer, therefore the office of Treasurer is open. Appointment will be necessary as soon as possible.

At this time the gavel was passed to Debbie Pilch.

President's Report: As a thank you for her past four years of service, Debbie Pilch presented a plant and Showcase gift certificate to Carol Larson.

President Debbie Pilch reported that the general GAA membership could benefit from receiving the monthly board meeting agenda, as a way to bring interested individuals to participate in our meetings. Motion to send the GAA agenda with the monthly meeting notice was made by Claire McNear and seconded by Delilah Fiechter. Motion approved.

President Pilch noted that there should be a Special Committee designated as the GAA group of Stampede Western Art Exhibition and Sale Committee to report information between the Greeley Stampede group and GAA. Motion to approve the GAA Group of Stampede Western Art Exhibition and Sale Committee was made by Michelle Hamilton

and seconded by Carol Larson. Motion approved. Debbie Pilch and Colette Pitcher have volunteered for this committee and will meet on January 10, 2023 with individuals from the Greeley Stampede.

Secretary's Report: Minutes of the November 7, 2022 meeting were presented with corrections. The time for adjournment of the November Board Meeting at 3:01 p.m. and call to order of the General Membership meeting at 3:02 p.m. The minutes were approved as corrected (Hamilton, Larson).

Treasurer's Report: Janet McGregor reported the balance in the bank is \$5,052.87, \$175.70 in petty cash, and one outstanding check for \$100.00.

President Pilch reported that Janet McGregor and Carol Larson will remain on the bank account until a new treasurer is in place.

Janet suggested a change to new member dues. She suggested \$30 dues for January/ February sign up and a \$3.00 per month prorated fee for the remainder of the year. Presently the dues are \$30 for January through December or \$15 for June through December.

A discussion followed regarding the use of credit cards for dues payment. The Board felt that any credit card fee should fall on the card user, not GAA. At this time, GAA does not have capability for payments via credit card. President Pilch tabled this discussion to be revisited in coming months.

Colette Pitcher stated that she will complete and submit the IRS 990 Return Organization Exempt from Income Tax form.

Membership Report: Colette Pitcher (for Tracy Stroh) reported that the GAA membership list is not complete with all who have paid 2023 dues, plus payments typically arrive in January. GAA will revisit the outstanding membership list in February and create a phone tree to contact those individuals.

Newsletter Editor's Report: Michelle Hamilton stated the next GAA newsletter will be out mid-February.

OLD BUSINESS: Colette Pitcher provided a recap of the Festival of Trees. GAA received the St. Nick's Pick Award. Members made fabulous "miniature easel" ornaments to decorate the tree.

"Joy of Art" Magazines, Volume 1 and 2 continue to be in boxes at the Showcase. Michelle Hamilton suggested that we use the magazines as publicity for the upcoming Stampede Western Art Exhibition and Sale. A motion to create a sticker/label for the Joy of Art Magazines advertising GAA and the Stampede Western Art Exhibition and Sale, and for members to distribute magazines was made and approved. (Hamilton, Mark) Debbie Pilch and Michelle Hamilton volunteered to created a label. General discussion was for each Executive Board member to take and distribute at least 5 of each magazine volumes to various locations in the community, such as medical offices, car dealerships, coffee shops, etc. This will take place in February, once the labels are affixed.

NEW BUSINESS: Colette Pitcher stated that she and President Debbie Pilch will be meeting with the Greeley Stampede Western Art and Exhibition Sale committee on Tuesday, January 10th.

Presentation: Colette Pitcher reported that many GAA members attended the Loveland Art Museum's John Cougar Mellencamp's Art Exhibit, followed by dinner at the Black Steer Restaurant.

Future presentations include a pastel demonstration in February, by former GAA member and past president, Judy Sprague. Judy will also discuss ideas on marketing and how to get artwork into galleries.

March, which is Women's History Month will bring us a presentation by Jane Thompson and Paloma Barraza, who have written the book <u>Women's Art Wednesday</u>. These women will "share history through celebrating the work of women creators". April - TBD

May - possibly the Cheyenne Art Guild Haus, a gallery on wheels.
