Greeley Arts Legacy* Hall of Fame 2022

On October 20, 2022 the Greeley Arts Legacy project hosted the 2022 Honoree Ceremony at the Hensel Phelps Theatre in the Union Colony Civic Center. The Arts Legacy recognized the following honorees:

MUSIC AWARD

Henry Ginsburg - Conductor and Music Director of the Greeley Philharmonic Orchestra 1934-1970. He also founded and conducted the Greeley Junior Philharmonic Orchestra. A UNC music faculty member (1931-1958), Henry organized the Greeley String Quartet in 1947 in which he and his wife Blanche also performed.

VISUAL ART AWARD

Jim Klingman - Jim is fondly known in pottery circles as "that potter from Greeley". Jim considers himself a functional potter working in porcelain. Since 1979, Jim has owned and operated a full time clay studio. In service to the community, Jim has significantly enhanced the arts in Greeley. Jim has served as President of Madison and Main Cooperative, Vice Chair of the American Association of University Women Art Mart, Member of the Arts Alive Board of Directors, serving on the Greeley Arts Commission for 18 years and as a member of the board of directors for the Greeley Arts Legacy. With galleries in five locales, Jim has been invited to over 50 exhibitions throughout the country.

LEADERSHIP AWARD

Rhonda Welch - Rhonda began her career in Greeley as a volunteer for the Cultural Affairs Department. After 10 years of volunteering, she was hired by the City as the house manager/volunteer coordinator at the then under construction Union Colony Civic Center (UCCC). Later the City selected Rhonda as the Festival and Events Coordinator in Greeley. Rhonda coordinated the three largest events in Greeley: the Annual Arts Picnic; the Neighborhood Nights Program and the Festival of Trees.

The Whitney Museum of American Art

Manhattan, New York by Michelle Hamilton

At the beginning of the 20th century, sculptor, Gertrude Vanderbilt Whitney recognized artists with unique and new ideas who had difficulty exhibiting and selling their art. She began purchasing and exhibiting their artwork eventually becoming a leading patron of American Art between 1907 until her death in 1942.

Starting in Greenwich Village in 1914, Gertrude Vanderbilt Whitney established the Whitney Studio. It was in this studio she displayed exhibits by living American artists whose work had been disregarded by the traditional art academies. By 1929, she had acquired a collection of more than 500 pieces of art. Mrs. Whitney offered to 'gift' the collection to the Metropolitan Museum of Art (MOMA). When her collection gift was snubbed by MOMA, Mrs. Whitney set up her own institution, Museum of American Art, which opened in New York in 1931 on West Eighth Street near 5th Avenue. She created a distinct singular mandate: *to focus exclusively on the art and artists of the USA*.

After several moves to expanded sites in New York City, the Whitney Museum

returned downtown to a waterfront lot smack in the middle of the old meat-packing district of Manhattan, mere blocks away from where the museum was founded in 1931. Photo right shows the Whitney Museum of American Art located at 99 Ganseyoort Street.



Today the Whitney's collection includes over

25,000 works, created by more than 3,700 American artists during the 20th and 21st centuries. On October 21, 2022 I experienced a virtual tour of the

Whitney Museum of American Art sponsored by the Meet Up Group entitled *Washington, DC History and Culture.* (For more information on this Meet Up Group, click on the following link https://www.meetup.com/


Gertrude Vanderbilt Whitney was born into wealth and class as the daughter of railroad magnate, Cornelius Vanderbilt. Gertrude studied sculpture in Paris, yet she retained the heart of a rebel artist. Upon her return to New York City, Gertrude leaned into boho-chic.

While the art society continued to snub works by living American artists, Whitney amassed a collection. In 1916, Gertrude commissioned Robert Henri (pronounced Hen-rye) to paint her portrait (right). Lounging on the chaise in "pantaloons" was a rebellious act. Gertrude's husband, Harry Whitney, objected to the pants and refused to hang the portrait in their home.



During the late 19th-early 20th century, Henri was part of a group of Realistic artists, of which Henri was the most extensively trained member of the group as he had studied at the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts under Thomas Anshutz. Henri became a mentor to four Philadelphia illustrators - William James Glackens, George Luke's, Everett Shinn, and John Sloan. They all moved to New York City and became the first generation of what became known as the Ashcan School. Turning away from the romantic ideals of the Impressionists, the Ashcan School focused instead on the hard realities of urban living; a style that Henri famously coined "art for life's sake". The artists produced works depicting scenes of daily life in New York, often in the city's poorer neighborhoods.


According to The Met, the Ashcan artists focused on portraying the vitality of the city and recording its "seamy side". They were not social critics or reformers nor did they paint radical propaganda; avoiding civil unrest, tension among classes and the "grit of the street". While they identified with the lower classes and committed to register the dismal aspects of urban existence, they themselves lived pleasant middle class lifestyles enjoying local bars, restaurants, theater and vaudeville (Weinberg, 2010, The Met).



More than just a painter, however, Henri organized two independent exhibitions that challenged the hierarchal norms of the American art establishment by dispensing with jury selections and the awarding of prizes. Equally well respected as an art educator, Henri encouraged a process of self-discovery among his students, some of whom would join the ranks of America's most important 20th century artists. His philosophies on art were published in the book The Art Spirit (1923), a tome that still exerts influence on artists to this day.

If you are lucky enough to be in New York between October 19 - March 5, 2023, The Whitney Museum is featuring an exhibit entitled **Edward Hopper's New York**. The slide to the right is a self-portrait by Hopper that includes details about the Whitney's collection of Edward Hopper's work - the largest Hopper collection at **3100** pieces!

For Hopper, New York was a city that existed in the mind as well as on the map, a place that took shape through lived experience, memory, and the collective imagination. It was, he reflected late in life, "the American city that I know best and like most."

Greeley Art Association (GAA) member, Mary Lynne Pruett was born in Delta County, Colorado in the picturesque town of Paonia, a hidden little gem on the western slope. Growing up in Raton, New Mexico kindled her love of the American Southwest landscape.

Raton High School sweethearts, Mary Lynne and Leonard Pruett are celebrating 63 years of marriage. After three years of training at St. Mary Corwin School of Nursing (Pueblo), Mary Lynne graduated as a Registered Nurse (RN). She enjoyed a 36 year career as an RN specializing in areas such as Med-Surg and Labor and Delivery Nursing.

Mary Lynne worked as an RN in Fort Collins while Leonard attended Colorado State University (CSU). Leonard grew up on the historic TO Ranch near Raton (his father was the ranch manager). At CSU, Leonard earned a bachelor and master's degree in Vocational Agriculture. He became a Livestock Program Leader and Area Extension Director for CSU in Lamar, Colorado.

Mary Lynne did not recall much art or painting in her childhood, other than her dad drawing caricatures for fun. As an adult she developed an interest in drawing, art and painting. First, she attended a few drawing classes with Dr. Johnson at Trinidad Junior College (TJC). Next, she took two semesters of art history classes. Then, Mary Lynne started attending painting workshops south of Lamar in Baca County (Springfield). From there she joined the South East Colorado Art Association (SECAA).

In the early 1990's, Mary Lynne took art classes at Garden City Community College in Kansas. The teacher had a Master's degree in Art. Mary Lynne praised her instructional skills. Curiously, none of the students ever saw that

instructor pick up a paint brush to demonstrate techniques, although she shared many completed works with her students.

Also offered through Garden City Community College, Mary Lynne fondly recalled her first drawing class held at the home of Yvonne Lewis... "she brought a bowl of popcorn into the studio, threw it on the table and told her students to *draw it*". Yvonne Lewis lived in rural Syracuse, Kansas in a converted barn with a gallery and studio on the lower level with living quarters on the second story. Mary Lynne enjoyed attending weekly classes at Lewis' barn gallery studio.

By the mid 1990's, steeped in knowledge from classes in drawing, watercolor, acrylic, mixed media and oil, Mary Lynne was fully hooked on painting. Oil painting now is her favorite medium within which to work. She described herself as a "fast painter" and chuckled when she remembered putting "more time into mixed media than oil" [paint].

When asked what inspires her artwork, Mary Lynne identified the American Southwest as something she knows and loves. "I've been to the Ghost Ranch eight times". Famous as the home to Georgia O'Keeffe, Ghost Ranch near Abiquiu, New Mexico (60 miles northwest of Santa Fe) is surrounded by dramatic red and yellow cliffs that characterize the Rio Arriba County landscape. A love of travel and multiple opportunities to see an abundance of great art continuously sparks inspiration.

Inspired by the American Southwest, this writer anticipated Georgia O'Keeffe might be listed among her favorite artists. Nope. Mary Lynne stated the Impressionists were her favorite group of artists. "I'm not into photorealism. I like something to look painterly". Heavily influenced by PBS *Welcome to My Studio* host Helen Van Wyk, Mary Lynne described her teaching style... "she took the time to explain the reason behind every brush stroke and the value of each stroke in achieving a finished work. Van Wyk was a great teacher and painterly artist". The term *painterly* describes color, stroke and texture as a distinct set of painting qualities.

The idea of painterly qualities seemed a perfect segue into the next question: Is there a tool or color in your studio that you could not live without? "No" she quickly responded but then added that she enjoys seeing texture and strokes in art work. "I like a boar bristle brush and sometimes use a palette knife to

achieve these effects". Friends describe Mary Lynne's work as loose and colorful.

Mary Lynne tends to paint from her own reference photos. She often does a quick sketch on toned canvas paper to formulate her composition and identify the right values. Citing 'The Kon Artist' (Ben Konis, Amarillo, TX), Mary Lynne learned that *color matters less than getting the value right*. Always standing to paint, with her eyes, face, body square to the canvas, Mary Lynne said her first priority is to get the canvas covered with paint whether painting in her studio or en plein air. As a new member of the Plein Air Artists of Colorado (PAAC), Mary Lynne laughed as she described herself as a a "fair weather girl" with little interest in painting outside in the wind, snow or cold.

"Oh that's a really good question" Mary Lynne exclaimed when asked how she knows when a work is completed or finished. "When I'm tired of it"... explaining that she is a fast painter so more than a day or two on the same painting easily tires her of the subject matter. Alternately, "I know it's done when I stand back, look at the piece and I'm satisfied".




Atmospheric Perspective


Rotten Art



GAA EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING MINUTES

EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING: On October 3, 2022, the Executive Board of the Greeley Art Association (GAA) was called to order by GAA President Carol Larson at 2:00 p.m.

MEMBERS IN ATTENDANCE: Carol Larson, Debbie Pilch, Michelle Hamilton, Tracy Stroh, Val Vickarelli, Joe Mora, Colette Pitcher, Sheryl and Jeff Wilson, Claire McNear, Ralph Tarnasky, Delilah Fiechter, and Jean Mark.

OFFICER REPORTS:

PRESIDENT REPORT: President Carol Larson reported that the slate of nominees will be presented at the November GAA meeting and election of GAA officers will take place in January 2023. Carol requested that the Nominating Committee report on their search for a Vice-President nominee. Michelle Hamilton shared that the committee contacted 12 individuals, of which two members are considering the VP position.

Member at Large, Jan Knutson, has requested to step down from her position. Carol Larson appointed Delilah Fiechter to replace Jan as Member at Large, effective immediately.

SECRETARY: The minutes of the September 12, 2022, meeting were approved as presented.

TREASURER: The Treasurer's report showed a balance of \$5,099.87, which included \$110.00 in petty cash. The Treasurer's report was approved as presented.

MEMBERSHIP: Tracy Stroh reported that GAA has 65 members, with all dues paid.

NEWSLETTER EDITOR: Michelle Hamilton shared that the most recent newsletter went out on September 15th. The next newsletter will be sent at the end of November and will include the slate of nominees for the Vice President position.

OLD BUSINESS: The Duraplaq company can create ornaments at the same price as last year, which was \$6.00. The board decided that members can order ornaments on their own, rather than GAA making such a purchase.

Festival of Trees will take place on November 25 through December 3, 2022. GAA will have a tree decorated for the event. Mini 3" canvas/easels will be painted at today's GAA general meeting for ornaments on this year's tree. Any member may pick up a blank canvas/easel ornament at the Showcase, to be painted and returned by November 15th.

NEW BUSINESS: The Stampede Art Show committee has met with a group of GAA members with the possibility of GAA assisting with the June/July event. In September, Carol Larson sent a request to members for feedback on the possibility of partnering with the Stampede Art Committee. Carol received 17 responses, of which 7 members agreed to help with the project. The GAA members communicating with the Stampede Art committee are Debbie Pllch, Carol Larson, Colette Pitcher, and Val Vickarelli. The Stampede Art Show runs for two weeks, usually between June 24-July 4th, at Island Grove Park in Greeley. There would be a need of 25-30 people involved in various committees, such as marketing, publicity, setting up, tearing down, etc. There are two objectives to the Stampede Art Show: To promote Western art and to raise money for scholarships and the Stampede Foundation. All of the scholarships go to continuing education for Weld County students. GAA will meet with the Stampede Art Show group in October and request that the Stampede Art Show have more community involvement. A combined exhibit with "Legacy" invitational artists, community/regional artists, and emerging young artists will be suggested.

Colette shared that "western" art is not exclusively cowboys and horses. She said it can be anything from the West, including pottery, sculptures, paintings, and stained glass artwork. Colette also suggested that there could be workshops or demos during the day, as the show is open from 4-8pm. Additionally, we could create a "Stampede Legacy Artist" designation for artists who would meet some particular set of qualifications. Traditionally, there has been a gala party and auction during the Stampede Art Show. The board moved and approved for GAA to commit to this project, subject to the conditions met by the Stampede Art Show Committee. Further discussion and final vote will take place at the November GAA meeting.

PUBLICITY: GAA has submitted a proposal to exhibit at the Tointon Gallery. We are still waiting on a reply.

Your Place Coffee has an exhibit of fifteen GAA members' artworks on display during the month of October.

Members are welcome to investigate other opportunities for exhibiting artwork.

ANNOUNCEMENTS: Quick Draw, a fundraiser for Rotary, is this Friday, October 7th. Numerous GAA members will be participating and painting at this fundraising event.

GAA EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING MINUTES

At 2:01 PM Nov 7, 2022 President Carol Larson called the Executive Board meeting to order.

MEMBERS IN ATTENDANCE: Carol Larson, Debbie Pilch, Michelle Hamilton, Val Vickarelli (Zoom), Janet McGregor (Zoom) Joe Mora, Colette Pitcher, Sheryl and Jeff Wilson, Ralph Tarnasky, Delilah Fiechter, Dan Augenstein, and Warren Larson.

GUEST PRESENTER:

President Carol Larson invited guest Mike Ketterling of the Greeley Stampede (GS) to provide some background on the GS Art Show. Mike was on the GS Committee between 1998-2001. Around the year 2000, local citizens and current director of GS decided to incorporate an Art Show exhibition into the GS (similar to other big exhibitions and rodeos). Mike Ketterling was in charge of the Art Show 2002 - 2014 (a committee known as the Stampede Art Council). Ketterling has stepped back since 2014 in the hopes of identifying "fresh blood and new people" to run the Art Show at GS. The Stampede Art Council has found it difficult to find interested parties to volunteer to produce and run the GS Art Show.

For the past three months, GAA Representatives Carol Larson, Debbie Pilch, Colette Pitcher, and Val Vickarelli have met with former members of the Stampede Arts Council (Mike Ketterling and Bob Hinderacker). The GS is eager to collaborate with the Greeley Art Association to (GAA) to re-energize the GS Art Show and the people involved with the production. Thus far, two memorandums of agreement (MOA) were drafted. The second MOA dated Nov 1, 2022 was recently presented to the chairman and the executive director of the Stampede Committee. The overall response from Stampede Committee was positive. The GS and GAA proposal will not move forward until the GAA membership vote at Nov 7, 2022 General Meeting. Additionally, on Nov 7 the Greeley Stampede General Board will vote on the partnership between GS and GAA.

OFFICER REPORTS:

MEMBERSHIP: Debbie Pilch (for Tracy Strohl) reported that GAA has 66 members with all dues paid.

NEWSLETTER: Michelle Hamilton reported the next newsletter will be disseminated during the week of Thanksgiving. It will include the nomination and biography for the Vice President position and many other informative pieces of interest.

OLD BUSINESS: Debbie Pilch provided a summary of the October YOUR PLACE COFFEE exhibit. "It went great... no magazines sold." Fifteen GAA artists' paintings were on display for the month of October. The exhibit was well received by the community members and appreciated by shop owners Danielle and Miguel. Two paintings were sold and the exhibit provided additional exposure about GAA and the members who submitted artwork.

Colette Pitcher provided an update on the Festival of Trees (FOT). GAA will have 48 miniature paintings/easels to hang on the tree. Set up day is November 21, 22 and the 23 is 'touch up day'. Tear down is Sunday, December 4, 2022. Volunteer sign up is informal; interested individuals should let Colette know (Sheryl Wilson volunteered). Carol Larson asked Colette to describe the benefits of the partnership for GAA membership: exposure and potential to raise money for association and scholarships for students. For the vote today we are seeking to have membership answer the question: Do we want to take on this partnership? GS will be asking their board the same question about the partnership during their evening meeting on Nov 7, 2022.
